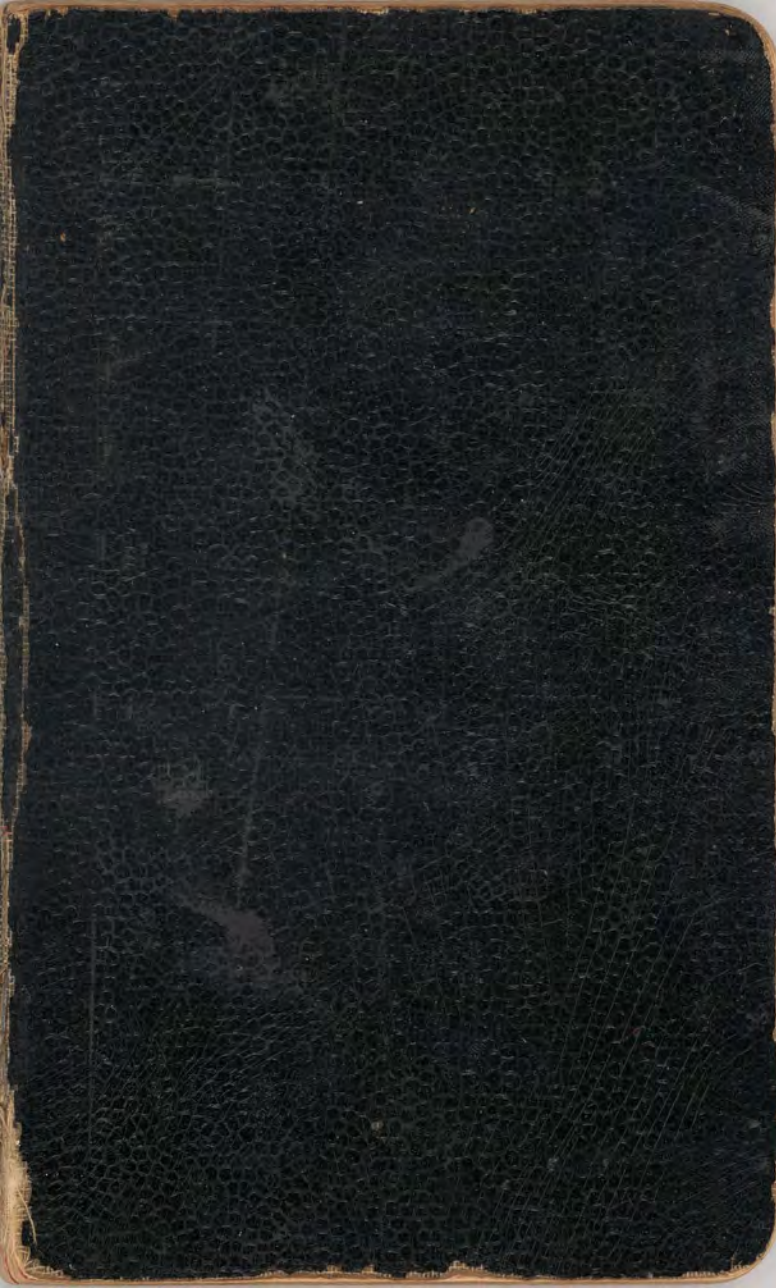


Diary of Benjamin

Drainy. March 4

Left Bern - 10.22 A.M. Arrived
at Mainz 4.15. Fine scenery along
the Rhine. The way to see it however
is by boat. The finest scenery
is between Coblenz and Ruyern.
Agreed place to stop at for a
day or two would be Ridesheim;
Mainz is a very fine large city.
The most noteworthy things I
saw were the Cathedral and
the Gutenberg statue.

March 5.

Walked about Mainzheim.
about finest things there are
the statue of Schiller in front of
theatre where Schiller's plays
were first presented and the
fountain in the parade place.
Took train to Heidelberg at
11.45. Drove first to Hotel

After, recommended by Baedeker. It was a very dirty second class place. They had only one bed room that they could heat. I went across the street to the Prinz Carl which is very good indeed. Had a good lunch. N. is a very picturesque spot. It is uncommon for walks and scenery. Took a long walk after lunch across the old bridge over the Neckar then to the right to the Kirschgasse then up the Kirschgasse by the Philosophen Weg to the Aussichtsturm on the Königss Berg. The view is magnificent. My hotel commands a fine view of the castle. Took two photos from the window of my room.

On my way back from my walk I stopped at the famous Kirschgasse Cantina for a lunch and was asked to come tomorrow to see some duelling. It's the most famous duelling place in Europe. March 6.

Kiedelberg. After breakfast went to Kirschgasse and saw some duelling. Fine duelling hall with students banners - Records simply said 'Los!' & 'Halt'. Not so much as at Bonn. Then went successively to Hehlens-Möller-Kur - Kirchstuhl - Felsen Meer - Wolfsbrannen. Road from Wolfsbrannen back to Kied. is very beautiful. Left N. at 7.30. Reached Strasbourg at 10.21. Lodged at Hotel

Reveries - Good Place. A note
to mamma & then to bed.

Big day. Tired out.

Mar. 7. Strasbourg is a very
quaint old city, more so than
any I have seen. A peculiar
feature of the roofs is that
they rise up very tall and
have 3 or 4 or 5 rows of dormer
windows in them. There
are very many stork nests
on the chimneys but there
is not the season for
storks. The Cathedral is
well worth visiting - As a
whole it lacks symmetry
but its individual parts
are very fine. It is a very
good exhibition of the
Romanesque, Renaissance

and Gothic forms all in
one building. The three
portals - the steeple - the
great rose window, the
stained glass, and the pro-
portions of the interior all
impressed me. Of course I
saw the great clock and it
is well worth it. The work
is very life like. I left
Strasbourg at 2.25 for Luzern.
March 8. Luzern is a most
beautiful place. Mamma
must see it if possible. These
are the first snow mountains
I ever saw. The effect is
that of distant clouds. It
does not seem possible that
they are mountains. They look
so light and airy. The lion
is closed in, so could not

see him. Neither in the
Rigi Bahn open yet. Could
see the hotel on the summit
very plainly with my glass.
The water of the River and
of the Lake is as clear as
crystal. One can see way
to the bottom. In afternoon
went to the ~~Rosch~~ Dütch and
the Drei Linden - magnificent
views from both. Red houses
in the Kohn market and
weir market. Sunset
glow on the mountain -
Walked from Dütch to
Dorfenberg - fine.

March 9 - Started at 8 A.M.
up Uerwaldstätter See.
Beautiful day and wonderful
scenery. Got off at ~~Fluelen~~ Brun-
nen and walked to Fluelen
9 1/2 miles in a little less
than two hours - saw Zelli
Chapel - Zelli Platte - meadows
of Rüttli. Alps of Uri magnif-
icent. Look at Gotthard train
at 1.19. Had no dinner.
Ride over and through more
tunnels - 25 min. tunnel -
Reached Bellinzona at 6.10.
Left at 7.45 for Locarno
Stopped Hotel Metropole
& Corone - Fine resort
Look boat at 10 A.M. ^{Monday 10} to
Pallanza - beautiful place -
scenery as Maggiora
splendid.

Reached Arena a little
after six and found cin-
ema house shut up until
Monday. Had to leave big
grip there. Also key. They
promised to send them
here Monday. Reached
Milan at about 9.30 -
Went to Hotel de l'Europe -
Good place - Room rate
\$2.00 a day.

Mar. 16. 2.13.

Spent in Milan. Fine
City. Cathedral much above
my expectations. Went on
roof and tower - saw the
trouble. Galleries or Arcade
the finest in Europe - Lombard
Hall is a good place to spend
the evening. Good music

Finest things to see here
outside of the Cathedral are
the church of St Lorenzo,
of St Ambrogio - of Maria del
Gracia with Leonardo da Vinci
's Last Supper - The Museum
de Brera or rather the picture
gallery - The Ambrosian library
and the Public Gardens -
Tonight at 7.15 I leave for
Verona. (March 13)

March 14 - stopped off half a
day at Brescia - the quaintest
town I have seen yet. Happens
to King's birthday. Big military
display. Most interesting thing
I have seen here is the museum
of antiquities which is in an
ancient temple of Vespasian
time (22 A.D.) The outside is

very picturesque - took in
photo of it. Also bought a
photo of the bronze victory which
was found here and which
stands on the inside - It is a
very beautiful statue. Left
for Verona at 1.07 - Big jute
on a Verona or at Brescia.
Got a fairly good room at
Hotel Accademica for 2.50, in
evening went to theatre of Opera
by Meyerbeer.

Mar. 15. W. at 6. to take
70' clock for Mantua. Reached
Mantua at 8.30 and immediately
went out of the Porta Cesare for
a 3 mile walk to Pietole the
supposed birthplace of Virgil.
The Porta Cesare has inscribed
on it Porta Virgilis. The road

lies through a very beautiful
but perfectly flat country. The fields
are about 10 ft below the level
of the road and are ditched
the ditches lined with willows -
Many olives along the road. In
general the country looks just like
Holland. A tramway runs from
Mantua along the road. Met some
bicycles - many derbys. The snow
clad Alps back of Mantua are in
sight all the day. This is indeed
the country of the Aeneas and
Georgics. Women working in
the corn on the outskirts of the
village. The ground the boards
with the clatter. Pietole is surrounded
with rich olive orchards and vineyards -
The olive nearest to the vine.

Statue of Virgil at Pietola -
Inscription on front:

o quell'ombra gentil
per cui si nomò
Pietola più che villa
mantovana

On right side:

Primum idumaeae referant tibi,
Mantua
Kalamas.

On left side -

Et nunc servat,
honor
sedem
tuum

Took two photos - went into
the ^{Bateria} ~~Abbazia~~ ^{Veigilio} and drew
some good Italian units to the
maison of the poet: Duccobal place.
A little of fine view to S.

Returned to Verona at 1.45
and visited the amphitheatre.
I was much impressed by the
solidity of the masonry.
There are 4 series of vomitoria,
and as many praecinctiones
around the building. The arena
is elliptical. Part of the front
focade still stands and has been
restored so as to rise a full
story higher than the rest.
The stairs rise from each side of
each vomitorium and then unite
in the middle over it. 
The inner passage admit each to
two praecinctiones the alternate
inner arches containing steps.
March 16

Spent the forenoon first
in watching the splendid

funeral of Cardinal Ruffi
di Canossa. from the Cather-
dral. It was a gorgeous
church pageant. Then I
inspected the Cathedral, went
to Castello Vecchio and the
church of San Gervasio (one of
the finest Romanesque
churches in Italy). After
dinner spent the time in
and about the Place dell'Erbe
the ancient forum of the
city. It is a very interest-
ing place and gives fine idea
of medieval architecture.
Many buildings pointed.
Turning the balconies very
fine examples of Gothic.
Next saw the Church of
St. Anastasio.

Left Verona at 4.45 for
Venice. arrived at Venice
at about 8 and rode
per gondola to Hotel Metropole
(Pension 7 1/2 francs) good
place.

March 17 - After breakfast
went to Cooke - no letters
awfully disappointed. Sent
a telegram. Then went into
St. Marks. Most splendid church
I ever saw or imagined.
In afternoon waited at
hotel for reply to telegram.
Went to Cooke again at 5.30
no letters. Went telegraph
office, no reply. Went back
to dinner. Reply to telegram
came at 8.00. Feel better.
It rained hard all day.

March 18 - Rome. Went to
Accademia of Fine Arts. Spent
morning there. Specially
struck with the Zittione,
Bellini's Zintoretto and
Paul Veronese. In after-
noon went to St. Mark's.

March 19. Weather a little
better. After breakfast took
a walk to the Rialto. Very
busy market scene. Took boat
from there to San Marco.
Went through Doge's palace.
Best place to see Paul Veronese
and Zintoretto. Very good view
Piazza. Horrible. Went over to
the bridging rights. Went up
on the Campanile. Fine
view of the Alps. Had lunch
and took gondolier to train.

Hardly lost any pocket books.
Nothing of value in its inventory
excepting keys. Reached
Trent at 9. Went to the
Exchange Hotel. Good place
with popular restaurant.
Room only 3 fr.

Mar. 20. Trent much finer
place than I had supposed.
Magnificent harbor. Mountains
in behind the city. Got some
very pretty postals. Sailed at
11.20. Adriatic beautiful and
calm as a pond. Ship a.k.
My quarters are clean but
not sumptuous.

Mar 21. A beautiful day
Reached Brindisi at 10 P.M.
Looked very pretty from the water.
Party from Amer. school at
Rome came on board. Among

three lobes. Prof. Blätner
the head of the school &c
about a dozen in all. They
are going to Patras and Olympia
the same day. Boat very full.
March 22. Beautiful day and
magnificent scenery along the
coast of Epirus and Corcyra.
Saw the ship of Ulysses.
Took photographs of harbor
Aerocranion. We land first
at Santa Corinta then at Corfu
then at Patras. Took pictures
of the harbor of Rethymon
and 2 views of Corfu. Arrived
at Patras at 6 A.M. Mar 23.
March 23. Took train from
Patras at 7.45. 3rd class -
cost 13.90 & return ticket. Arrived
at Olympia at 12.55. Stopped

at Hotel archida - with the
crowd. Had a good dinner -
First taste of Greek wine -
Bah!! After dinner gang
went to Museum. I went
to museum. Preferred to
work them out alone. Had
a glorious time. First
went on Kronion and
got a view of the whole
field. Then traced W. and
S. Altir wall - studied Tem-
ple of Zeus carefully and
its surroundings. The Pto-
leion and the altar of Zeus.
Went into Museum a short
time must put in more
time tomorrow. Put one
picture of the Hergeon and
the Kronion behind it.

In the evening big cave
with the Thinks.

March 24 - Spent forenoon
in the ruins - Also afternoon
excepting as above in the
museum.

Mar. 25. Left Olympia at 5.25
A.M. Got up at 4. Rode
to Patras 2nd cl. Felt tired
so took 2nd class to Athens
Elusive scenery along gulf
of Corinth and Ionia
Gulf. Reached Athens at
8. 7.15. Mart was there
and had everything all
easily fixed. Having a good
room here at 10 drachmas
a day (Fr. 30) which is
cheap for Athens.

March 26. Spent the forenoon
with Mart and the Pattersons
in the Acropolis. Very inter-
esting - No picture does justice
to the bold grandeur of the
Acropolis. Spent most of the
time at the Propylaea and
the Parthenon. In afternoon
went about town. Fell in
with the Pats and went
with them to see the sun
set from Philopappos.

27 - Trip to Larium & Luni.

28 - Forenoon reading & writing
Afternoon went to German
Institute and heard Böckfeld
Lecture. Wonderfully fine
lecture - A discussed a
theory that Reueas is the
Ithaca of Homer, that

present Uthraa was home
and Aphallenia was
Jelichium. Very plausible.
He is going there soon to
hunt for the palace of
Alysser.

29. Reading & Writing. In
afternoon was going to
Clemis with the Pate but
went to National Museum
instead on account of the
rain.

30 - Trip to Marathra
Great success.

31 - Went to Academy &
Colonel with Pat. returning
by way of the Sacred way.
After dinner went with
Maat to Syphron and heard
Dorfffeld lecture on it and

the Athenian walls - very good.
Afterwards Maat & I went to
the Russian Church and heard
some beautiful singing. Recd
4 letters today from Sweet
Maamoy, also from Linn
with Copyright statement -
Very satisfactory. Almost
\$450⁰⁰ for first six months
of this year.

April 1st Sunday - In morning
went to Church St George with
M. & M. & Mr. Platner. The
singing was exquisite.
In P.M. went to Clemis with
Pate. Very interesting. Also
saw mosaics in Church of
Saphne. Also ancient site
of temple with niches in the
rock. It was very interesting

to trace the course of the
sacred way by the cuttings
in the rocks.

Apr 2. Trip to Phyle.
Grand scenery. Walked
7 1/2 hours. Fort on top
well preserved. Interesting
peasants.

Apr. 3. Rested up a little from
yesterday. In morning went
to Acropolis and studied the
E. side and the Erechtheum.
In P.M. took two photos on the
Acropolis and called with
Martin on Mr. Bickelae and
the Richardsons. I was going
with him to Minister Hardy
but found him and his
wife at the Richardsons.

April 4. Trip to Salamis.

" 5. Went about town
getting ready for big trip.
Went to German School and
got developed plates. Some
poor evening to starry light.
Dr. Dörpfeldt invited me
over for tomorrow night but
could not accept owing
to departure for Delphi.
Dr. & wife very fine and
friendly people.

April 6. Started at 7 A.M.
on our long trip. 4 hours.
Reached Thebes at 5.30 P.M.
Fine drive. Beautiful view
from top of Pithaecora - sight
of Parosaurus Delphi and
Thebes. Had a fair
supper at Greek restaurant.
Stopped at Hotel Cadmus
Thebes.

7. Rode to Lebadeia after breakfast on sidewalk at Thebes. This is Greek independence day and the whole town is out to celebrate. Men mostly in festal dress. We took a walk after breakfast and visited the fountain of Asclepius. Very picturesque, took a picture of it. Then took pictures of fountain of Ares. The ride through the Boeotian plain was very fine. The finest view was where we reached the top of a ridge and looked down upon Lebadeia flanked by Helicon and Parosaurus on the left and right. Parosaurus was grand

covered with ruins and snow. When we got to the limits we met an immense crowd of people who were holding games. We were stopped by soldiers as the carriage could not get through. We dismounted and after watching the games for a time went to Hotel Helicon. Had supper at a fair restaurant. In the afternoon ~~April 8~~: we passed the gorge where Xerxes made his famous fight against the Greeks. The Copais sea is now drained and is covered with luxuriant crops.

Apr 8 - Stayed at Hotel
~~Helicon~~ (flea), but hotel
man was very white. Early
in the morning we took
a walk, went up to the
Frankish citadel. Saw
seat of Orestes & Apollo
Trophonius, fountain
of Menemene & Lethe.
Started at about 10 for
Chaeroneia & Orchomenos.
Terrific wind. Saw
battle field. It is over-
run by Parvassus. Saw
live. At Orchomenos
saw treasure house of
the Muses. Took photo
of treasure house. Pat
and I climbed up to
aeropolis ~~high~~

Orchomenos. Wind so strong
that we had to hang on
for dear life. We could
not stand. Stone steps
cut in living rock.

Apr. 9 - Memorable
horse back ride from
Livadhia to Delphi.
Finest scenery I ever
saw. Most remarkable
was view of Arachova. Took
photo - Great time at
inn there - Great
music - Best view after
leaving Arachova. Great
view of Plester valley, olive grove
sacred plain & Corinthian
Gulf. Stop for night
at Kastri. Wine of Patras
2 Drach. a bottle.

Apr. 10. Spent morning
walking about seeing
Delphi with A. E. Kontolacou
Spent afternoon mostly
in museum. Finest things
there the bronze charioteer
the athlete. Head of Apollo -
Antinous.

April 11 Took early walk.
Went into Delphic gorge.
Took picture of old Castalian
fountain. Water still run-
ning. Took picture of women
washing in Castalian fount.
Walked about ruins - saw
secret passage by which the
pythia went into the under-
ground chamber. Odont
fence of clasp ~ next T →
latit T

In afternoon went to
Korymbos(?) cave. Fine view
of Parnassus. Caught first in
a snow storm. Then in a
rain storm. Got drenched.
Cave very interesting. Much
nearly dried up. Cost
6 Drachmas.

April 12. Left Delphi at
about 8 by carriage for
Lith. Fine ride through the
immense olive grove in
the plain of Crissa. Took
steamer at about 11. Had
good lunch on board. Passed
through the Canal and
landed by tug at other end
whence we went by boat
to Corinth. We are here
at the Fars to Kion Tiv
even at what seems to

is a very good place, 10 dr.
a day. The ride through
the gulf charming. Splendid
view of Paros and of
Cyclades and of Mt. Erymanthus.
Opposite our hotel is a

building with a sign "ΣΥΛΛΟ
ΓΗ ΤΩ ΑΤΤΟΖΤΟΚΟΖ ΙΤΑΛΑ
ΟΖ"

Apr. 13. In morning drove
to old Corinth and took horses
for Akr Corinth. Very steep
immense Venetian fortresses.
View from top fine. Could
see Athens. On way down
met Mr. Platner with letter
good. Hammond & Powers
will vote for prolonging my
leave of absence. The diggings
at old Corinth were very

interesting. Saw them take
out of piece of statue -
low Pirene - House - The theatre
Propylaea of Agora etc. Leaving
Mr. P. & I walked back to hotel
3 1/2 miles -

Apr. 14. Started at 9.20 for
Nauplia. On stop on the way
at Lyrus. Large plain of
horse breeding Argos. Fine
acropolis with Flankish fortifica-
tion of the acropolis ancient
Argos. Cyclopean remaining
Tiryns very interesting. Next so
are the caved galleries. We
followed plain of the old palace
on the summit. Gulf of Argolis
at Argos and near Lyrus very
narrow. Possibly about 2 miles.
The view of Nauplia from Argos
and Lyrus is very beautiful.

On arriving at Nauplia
we went on to the Palame-
des or Citadel (800 steps)
which commands a mag-
nificent view. Saw the
prison up there and was
treated to Cognac by the army
officer. The next day they
illuminate the fortress.

Apr. 15. Started for
Epidaurium at 7.00 a.m. It
is a day's ride, mostly
through bare uninteresting
country. The ruins at
Ep. are very fine, next
to Olympia and Delphi.
Took photos of little theatre
in gymnasium and a
general view of the ruins.
Back at 6.30.

Apr. 16.

Trip to Mycenae. Argos &
Perseus of Argos.

Apr. 17 - Railed from Nauplia
to Mycenae over the gulf of Argolis
with Mr. Henderson. Before
that went with him and
Mr. Pharnakopolis to see
executioners island in the
harbor. Venetian cannon
balls in the sea.
At Mycenae Hercules killed
the Lernaean hydra. The
spring Amyclae springs
from under a ledge of
rocks at the foot of the
rocky hills in great columns
It makes a stream of
ice cold water about 15
ft wide and flows a

distance of about $\frac{1}{4}$ miles
through a marsh into the
sea. Good place for snakes.

The train came along at
12.10 and we went on to
Tripolitza. The first part of
the journey is very picturesque,
especially when the road
wind about the curve of
Parthenion. Beyond we
saw Mt. Taygetus in the
distance covered with snow
On arrival we went to the
Hotel d'Europe where we
shall probably be fairly
comfortable although the
floors are bare as usual
and the mattresses are
covered with burlap. Tripolitza
is a thriving city. The shops
are mostly under arcades

Enjoyed watching the shoe-
makers - Copper & blacksmiths
at work. Copper is hammered
out of a single piece. The
square was filled with
them but no women were
on the streets.

Apr. 18 - Drove to Sparta
Beautiful views of Taygetus
Sparta even at this time
almost tropical. Huge hedge
of cacti - Tomb of Leonidas
Foundations like those of a
temple, shorter & ft long.
Situation beautiful. Climate
without much water - British
Museum. Carver Pollux & Helen
Reliefs good. Went to theatre.
Not much left except cavea
and supporting walls on the

side. The old site of Sparta
has a number of remains
chiefly Roman. It is now
covered with plantations of
olive and mulberry.

April 19 - Took walk through
orange and sheep market.

Fine sight. Oranges 2 for a
cent. Hundreds of sheep and
goats. Preparatory to Easter.

Caroline P. left 200 gold
francs and gold watch in
chamber skin bag at Hotel
D'Europe at Tripoli. Put
the thing in the hands
of the police.

Apr. 20. Left Sparta at about
10 for Mistra where we put
in about 3 hours. A mountain
covered with extensive

Frankie ruins. After
lunch we took mules for
Tzuppi, a village at the
entrance of the Langada
Pass. The road thither
was rough. We spent a
miserable night in the
Khaku there. I was fearfully
bitten up. We slept on the
floor. Got up at 4 A.M.
and were on the way
through the gorge at 6. The
scenery was as grand as can
be imagined. Cliffs towering
on either side thousands of
feet high, rushing torrents &c.
The road through the Langada
gorge is fairly good. After you
leave the summit (4200 ft.)
it is bad all the way

until you reach Kalamata. A
worse road could not be ima-
gined even for a mule. We
reach K. after 10 or 11 hrs. at
about 4 P.M. K. is thoroughly
dead. It happened to be Good
Friday. The streets were full
of sheep being sold for Easter.
Shops with barrels of Easter
eggs - churches thronged.
In the evening brilliant illu-
mination, fire works &c.
at 10 pallg Chut borne
through the streets with all
population accompanying car-
rying candles and chanting
hymns - Very impressive.
Weeks very devout.

Saturday. Apr 21.

Mart. M. & the rest went back by train at 6. I decided to return by boat around Cape Matapan. The boat was scheduled to go at 11 but I was aroused early and informed that she was coming in port and would go at 8. I hurried down to the harbor in a carriage (1 dr.) then by small boat (1 dr.) to the steamer. Had to use my best Greek (?) to get along. The southern coast of the Peloponnese is very precipitous. As I am writing this we are approaching the vicinity of ancient Taenarum.

Perseus. The cliffs rise sheer out of the sea and there are numerous caves and other grotesque formations. Taking color to the mythical entrance to Hades. The wind is very high and when we get around Malea I presume we'll get it in the neck. Sundry blue water, lugger sized sailboat capsize - 3 men all saved. Wind very sudden and violent. Interesting sight of unloading stuff at certain points - Much shouting - rough sea. Ugly little rocky ledge and island just SW of Taenarum.

Big stone light house on
Laemaneun - only other habita-
tion near is a chapel on a
neighboring height - As soon
as you round the point
Malea and Cythera come into
sight. Cythera mostly high
especially towards the south.
Laemaneun about 100 ft high.

Frankish towers and ruins
all along the S. coast of Pelop.
Five trees of *Taxus* from
the sea as you approach
Cytherion. Peittheion beautiful
from the water - Built up
against a steep rocky hill
To the right of the harbor
lies the pretty green rather
flat island of Kranae or
Marathonisi.

Sunday Apr 22. On deck early
Beautiful sea this morning.
Quite rough in the night especially
around Malea. The Argian
islands lie all about. Just
now we are passing Poros.
Argina lies ahead characterized
by its sharp peak. These islands
all look much alike. They
are rocky and grey. Few show
much vegetation. The boat
is the *Cephalonia*. My bed
was hard and narrow but
clean. The food was good.
The engineer says we shall
reach Piraeus by 10 a.m.
We arrived before 10. All flags
out. Cannons and guns firing.
Papers come out with big
headlines ΧΡΙΣΤΟΣ ΑΝΕΞ-
ΤΗ.

Carrying of lambs wanted
whole on a spit with head
on through the streets

Apr. 23 - Yesterday afternoon
saw king's green and whole
royal outfit. Very ornery.

Apr 24. Enjoyed getting
a hair cut, new shoes
new hat and a general
return to civilization.

Mr. M. gone to Ecara. I
didn't care to go. In
afternoon saw game in
the stadium. Audience
of 40000. Site of old
stadium -

Apr 25 Went to museum
in forenoon with M. L.
Had a very enjoyable time
In P.M. called on

Mr. Rikélas. He took me to
stadium where I saw much
the same performance as
yesterday. After wards called
on Mr. Kalapothakis and
on Mr. Hardy M.S. minister
Charming people - with M. L.

Apr. 26 - Went to N. M. in
morning. In afternoon
went to Lower the winds
and to Acropolis - Climbed
into cave of Aglauros -

Apr 27. Went to N. M. with
M. L. At 12.30 went to
lunch at Mr. Rikélas, met
there Mr. Murdochson & Mr.
Pawson. After lunch
saw. Stayed in and
read John Harrison.

as we proceed, Mail &
Mary begin to come. Dinner
at 5.30 quite a failure.
Went to bed early as it
was too rough to do any-
thing. This part of the
Mediterranean is always
rough, so Capt. says.

May 6. Fine bright day.
Rough water till towards
evening. Pigeons flying
from Africa to Italy shot
white flying over the boat.
Went & Mary N.E. The
latter kept small day.
Beautiful sunset and
brilliant stars. Tomorrow
we shall see Aetna.

May 7 - Aetna loomed up
grandly from the sea. Covered
with snow. Only snowy sum-
mit visible. The lower part
veiled in mist. The summit
looks like an island of snow
suspended in the air.

May 8. Stayed at Catania
at the Grande Bretagne. fairly
good. Yesterday afternoon we
walked through the beautiful
Bellini Gardens. filled with
roses and commanding fine
views of Aetna. The finest
street in Catania is called
the street of Aetna. Aetna
looms up at the end of it.
This morning we visited
the San Nicola monastery
which contains a fine
library. The obelisk and

elephant in the Piazza
del Duomo is also interesting.
At 11.30 we took the train
for the circuit of Astua. This
was the first R.R. journey
I ever took. Grand stream
of lava alternated tropical
luxuriance of every sort. Steep
down volcanic forces in
evidence everywhere. Above
it all 11000 ft of Astua. Fea-
giant orange and lemon
green. From climb to
nearly 4000 ft. Magnifi-
cent view of the valley of the
Sierrita and after winding
of the Alcantara. We arrived
at Taormina at about
7.30. Then by an a dream-
like drive through the

moonlight to the San
Serafino hotel. Road winds
up above the sea to a
height of about 1000 ft. This
hotel was formerly a
monastery and retains all
the old characteristics.
Dining room in the refectory
and has a pulpit in it. Great
halls, corridors and
chapters with pictures of the
saints. My room com-
manded a fine view of
Astua.

May 9. Saw sun rise after
Astua. In morning went
to theatre, went into some
of the shops, very curious.
Great place for artists.
In afternoon went to Nola
and acropolis.

10 - May 10 - Walked about the city and in afternoon went down cliffs to town and walked along the shore with Cassini. Saw sunset from the theatre.

May 11. Sat in the garden and enjoyed the view until train time. Drove down to train which was $\frac{1}{2}$ hr late. That left no time for lunch at Catania. At C. the porter tried a dirty Italian trick on us to get a chance to handle our baggage. Ride from Catania to Syracuse very beautiful, through a most fertile land, mostly level. Had some fine distant views of Aetna.

On arriving at S. went to the Villa Politi which is right near the Capuccini Quay where the Greeks are said to have been imprisoned. In fact these quarries are wonderful. There are 4 or 5 of them. In one in the case of Syracuse with wonderful acrobatic effects. Went to theatre of Syracuse cut out of solid rock and saw sunset.

May 12. In morning took small boat across to Ortigia. Landed on the Marina and there walked to Anthonia. Beautiful spot, only width of sidewalk separates it from the sea. Then went to Castello and got a good view of the

entrance to the Great
Harbor, Plennyruin etc.
Then visited Cathedral
built on foundations of an
ancient temple. Saw the
so-called temple of Minerva.
Streets very narrow and
winding, but quite clean.
Evidence of former and
beautiful building everywhere.
At noon returned by
water. Small harbor is
very shallow. Must have
filled up. Traces of ancient
breakwater still visible.

In afternoon drove
through most beautiful
country to Ft. Ceryalus
Epipolae - Teligrafo etc.
Got a very clear idea of

the ancient fortifications.
Wonderful underground
passage cut in solid
rock. Belvedere most
wretched village on bare
rock. Peasant dancing.
Whole country wonderfully
beautiful. Trees are fig-
orange. Lemon olive, al-
mond, and perognanath.
In evening walked by
moonlight in Latorna
Capuccini.

May 13. Spent morning at
Anafan & Cyane. Went with
two rowers. First rowed
across small harbour and
under bridge connecting island &
mainland. Then sailed across
great harbour to mouth of

Anapara. From mouth of
river to junction with the
Cyane the row a canal.
The Cyane is a beautiful
clear streaming swift
blue water, quite deep
and from 10 to 20 ft
wide. The banks are
lined with papyrus, cane
and vines with bright
flowers growing between.
The fountain itself is
circular about 17 ft in
diameter and very deep.

Beautiful water plants
line the sides and bottom
and large fish swim in
it. We got some fine
specimens of the papyrus.

After lunch we went to
San Giovanni and saw the
catacombs, tomb of S. Marciano
&c. Then I went alone
to the amphitheatre and
theatre. Saw big cistern under
the house of the guard used
for manumission. On way
back got lost in a long
lane between walls.

May 14. Spent day on car
going to Trigenti. Most
beautiful fertile country,
most picturesque place we
passed was Cima on its
lofty height. Right opposite
river Calascibetta (?) almost
dug. (Sketch of a valley). As we
near Trigenti we pass
numerous sulphur mines.

Stop at Hotel du Temple.
Drove in morning ^{May 5} first
to temple of Concord. Took a
picture of it. Then to temple
of Juno Lacinia. As you stand
at S side you can clearly
trace the ancient S wall.

Great masses of rock lie in
the valley. Splendid view
of sea and city.

Fluting of Doric Columns in
Temple of Juno 20 in. wide.

On return saw remains
of old Doric pavement on
the road leading up to
the city from the Porta
Aurea. Left on afternoon
train for Palermo. Stopped at
Hotel du Palmer. Beautiful
place but too expensive for

May 16

Spent truly spent morning
in museum after going
to Dr. Florio for mail
and money. Finest
things in Museum are
the Pelimer reliefs.

In P.M. we took a drive
to La Favorita and Marina
Palermo is a very fine
city. Great drive on via
Libertà. All city out. English
garden in. We had evening
drive in Marina which
was very beautiful. In
the evening we went to
dinner at Mr. Whitaker's
a most elegant place.
He has invited us all to
put up at his place at
Castelluzzo and also

bar invited Mr La Ziem
& myself to stop at his
dispendency at Marrata
Good enough.

May 17. Got up at 4.15

Spent day at
Sigea. Temple wonder-
fully located on a height
with beautiful view. In
front to the left rises
the hill on which the
ancient city stood. It is
now full of building stone
and has the ruins of a
fine theatre. The view
from the theatre is very
fine. Most remarkable
feature of the temple is
that it is unfurnished
and shows how it was
built. Forded commander

There is the bandit region
of Sicily. Most of the men
Carry guns, and most of
them look very tough. The
village of Calatafimi
through which we passed
had a very hard looking
population and the beg-
gars that swarmed into
the hotel (Albergo) were
most persistent. This
morning when we arrived
at the station a man
started off for the interior
with an armed escort
of 4 toughs.

May 18. Started early for
Syracuse. The country stretches
out in a great fruitful
plain to the sea. The temple

stand on two hills with
a valley between. There is a
fishing village on the coast,
where they fish for sardines.
A very picturesque site.

The river Selinus is about
80 ft wide and on its banks
used parsley (*Σέλινος*)
still grows. There are now
few if any large palms at
Selinus but there is an
abundant growth of dwarf
palms. Possibly that accounts
for Vergil's "Palmorum". Further
on towards Marsala I saw
many giant palms and
at Trapani there is a
fine avenue of palm-trees
palms in the park.

The destruction at Selinus
is almost complete but the
ruins are colossal, especially
of temples C. and D. I have
seen nowhere such masses
of stone in a temple building.

The architecture is all Doric
and the temples when standing
must have been grand. A
little after lunch just as we
reached the second group of
temples West became very
sick and continued to grow
worse, vomiting frequently
and suffering great pain.

He thought best to go on to
Palermo however at 4 and
did so. I did not feel quite
right about letting him go
on without me, but clearly
I thought he would be better

the next day and this is my
only chance of seeing Lily-
balm and Sappan.

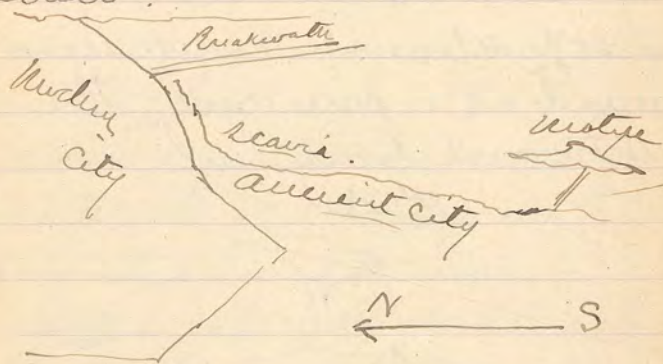
Mr. La fleur and I accordingly
went on at 5 to Marrala.

The Whitaker hospitality
preceded us for the evening at

Castrovetrano had tele-
graphed that we were
coming and when we
reached the place a fine
looking English gentleman,
Mr. Gray, met us cordially,
took us to his handsome
house out and drove us
all about Marrala &
finally to his house for

dinner at about 8 P. M.
(May 11) Marrala is built on level
ground. The fortifications

both ancient and modern
must have been artificial.
Two medieval bastions
are standing from the top of
which one gets a fine view
of the city, the harbor and
the Aeolian Islands. The
plan of the city is about
thus.



have excavations (scoria)
on the east have laid bare
considerable ancient wall
that dates from the Cartha-
ginian or Roman. Also

found atirine in the harbor.
 The stones are large and
 masonry good. Left
 Manana at 11 for Lapauni.
 Arrived at 12 and went to
 hotel Cominacria. Fairly good.
 After lunch Mr. Hepler and
 I started for the top of Monte
 San Guirava. (Mt. Eryx) Quite
 a stiff climb. As we ascended
 we had a fine view of the
 town and coast line.



I was especially interested in
 the little island Aninello to
 which as a goal Aninello's crew

arrived in the former boat
 race. The rocks which
 Aninello sat is still there.

Town on top of Eryx exceedingly
 medieval. Old Phoenician
 fortification may still be
 traced under more modern
 walls. Great square Frankish
 tower in the wall. Beautiful
 Norman Church, and other
 work of ^{the} Saracens. Old city
 grown rather one site of
 temple to Venus Erycina.
 Saw stones and drums of
 marble columns built into
 the walls. Fountain of
 Venus still there. Went up
 on high turret of the other
 castle, higher than the
 clouds. Wonderful view,
 on every side. Mt. Eryx is
 very precipitous. It is easy

to understand how a
force controlling it could
hold much of the surround-
ing country under control.
Wide fertile plains stretch
out on every side into
which forays for provision
could be made. There has
way down the mountain
is a small fertile tract which
Haemilar way have used
to raise grain. We got
back to town at about 7.
and went early to bed.

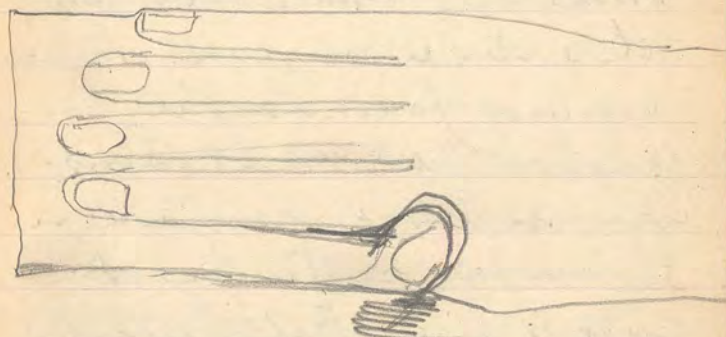
May 20. - Got up at 5 to
take 7 o'clock boat for Palermo.
Got safely on board. Fine
boat. Beautiful calm sea.
Had fine view of the Aeolian
islands and Columbaria which

Eutatus Catulus made his
headquarters in 242 when
he was besieging Drepanum
and from here the fleet
sailed out against the
Carthaginians and defeated
them in 241. An unpaired
around to the N side of Trapani
we passed close under the
rock upon which Pyrrhus
was wrecked (Asinello). The coast
line from Trapani to Palermo
is bold and picturesque
Most beautiful in the bay
of Castellammare. The view
of Palermo from the sea is
fine - ~~Coma~~ d'Oro.
After landing I went to see
here M. L. Tusa and found
him quite well. In afternoon

we went to the Villa Zica
and saw a fine baroque
fountain. Then to Villa
Bellevue on slopes of
Pelligrino. Then to Villa
Julia and Botanical Garden.
The latter is especially fine -
Avenue of palm and Magnolias.
May 26. Went by appoint-
ment to Merkeale with Wm.
Saw Cloister & Cathedral. The
mosaics in the latter are the
finest I ever saw. The whole
church shines like a jewel.

After lunch went to Museum
where I met Wm. I was
admitted free on Prof. Schumacher's
card to be shown the
'*Senecio hospitalis*' of which
I append the description.

They go brought to Naples by
steamer. Capleu went
at 2.40 to Zingenti.

May 22 - Went early to Palazzo
Reale & Capella Palatina.

Mosaic finest I have seen.
Whole chapel one jewel. Palace
also very fine. Bought
photos. Took 12.25 train
for Messina. No lunch.
Coast fine especially at
site of ancient Zindaris
& Mylae. At Cepole saw
famous Roman Church of
Roger. Good view of Lipari
Islands. Arrived at
Messina at 6. Put up at
Hotel Trinacria. Small town
excepting on the Marine.

May 23 - Sailed to promontory of
Charybdis (Strait of Palermo) about
3/4 mile wide. Long sandy point.
No rock. Took photo. Poor light.
Then sailed across to Villa San
Giovanni. Had big breeze. High
waves and sloppy. Had lunch
at "Antonio's Trattoria". Bread
rose wine and maccaurui.
Took train at 1 for Reila.
High bold cliff. very fine. Took
two photos. Train to Reggio at
2.30. Landing place St Paul.
Nice town - thoroughly Italian.
Picturesque shepherds dress. long
blue cap. velvet jerkin, flapping
breches. white shirt & drawers.
Roman sandals. Saw glorious
sunset from Strada Regina
Campi. Extra indescribable.

May
24 - Started 6.17 for Metapontum.

Can see Laconia from Lazzaro.
Capo Sall'Armi - precipitous rock
with light house on it ~~then~~
after Melito country grows
poor and stony - many Ser-
div fishermen. Amendolia -
marshy malarial tract. Moun-
tain retreat about 3 miles from
the shore. Much eucalyptus. Numerous
juniper & geraniums &
oleanders. - Capo Spartivento
is a point of sand. a few
rocks beyond it in the sea -
Back of it about 100 yds the
foothills of the Apennines rise.
Most of the country is bare and
sandy though some wheat is raised.
Ardore & Rosarno are beautifully
situated on spurs of the Apennines.

The country is now beautiful with
figs, olives, mulberry &
Gerace (Cocri) about $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles from
the sea - splendidly situated on a
high tableland with mountains
rising behind it.

Caulonia. station a little
N of ancient site. shore flat
low mountains near. No
ruins of ancient city visible
but an olive orchard with
ancient tower on its acropolis.

Country in general barren
and mountainous. About
Cropani large fields of grain.
Tract about Licium Promontory
almost deserted. Some up to grazing
and some grain. Big grove of eucalyptus
around station at Crotona - beautiful

Petelia (Strongoli) can be clearly
seen from the train. It is on a
high plateau surrounded by ~~steep~~

plain back of which are beautiful
mountains. Crati a fine
stream about 200 ft wide. Big
grove of eucalyptus. Arrived
at Metaponto 10.30. Poor room.

May
25th Rose early & missed train. Had
Charged me 6 fr. which I reduced
to 3.50 - Found a boy and went
to see ruins of temple of Apollo
by sea. Ruins complete. Hard
to find. Stone much worn.
Not a stone in place - Capital
about 5 1/2 ft square - A little of
peribolos wall. Relieve quadern
Groove not cut around capital
as at Selinus. Few blocks of pave-
ment & little of rear wall. Hard to imagine
that this desolate marshy plain
ever contained a great city. Depart
for Taranto 12.40. Name becomes
Vito Livio - Country towards
Tarantum is first low and fertile
then changes to sand covered
with pieces. Near Tarantum it is
beautiful, olive orchards -
The city is most beautifully situated

My window looks over the little
harbour in which lie a large number
of naval vessels. Beyond are visible
Munizir, Monte-mirula, & Zoltophis.
Walked about and got a view of the
bay of the land water. The island
marking the great harbor
went 3 or 4 miles out. The
inner harbor on the NE side is
fully of oyster beds. Apparently little
commerce here now. No shipping.
Very curious remains of Doric
temple, 2 columns - Distance
between capitals only the length
of my stick. Diameter $1\frac{1}{2}$ at top.
Length of plinth $2\frac{1}{2}$ sticks.
26 May. Up at 3, coffee at 3.45.
Tram 4.15 - Polivoro 7. Raining.
No ruins of Heraclea - Excavations
all covered. Lame came out after 2

while. Took 2 views of site - one
of village. Interesting example of
Padrone system. Women
cultivating big field of corn - all
spaced off. Little children with
heavy mallets - Poor things.
Interesting costumes. Kid at station
with pants open in front and behind.
Beautiful mountain scenery to the
NW of Heraclea. Pollione fine with its
snowy peaks. ~~mountain~~.

27-29 - Naples - Hotel Rellum.
Spent time in museum and
in the photograph establish-
ments. Great town for corals -
mosaics and Cameos.

30 - June 2. In Naples excepting
one day in Pompeii. Left
June 2 for Forum. Arrived
at about 10 P.M. and went to

Hotel des Fiers - best here but
second rate.

June 3 - A dark cloudy day. Very
poor chance for pictures.

Outlook from white balcony
upon public fountain and
bay of Formia - Beautiful.

Entrance to Cicero's Villa has
the inscription beginning

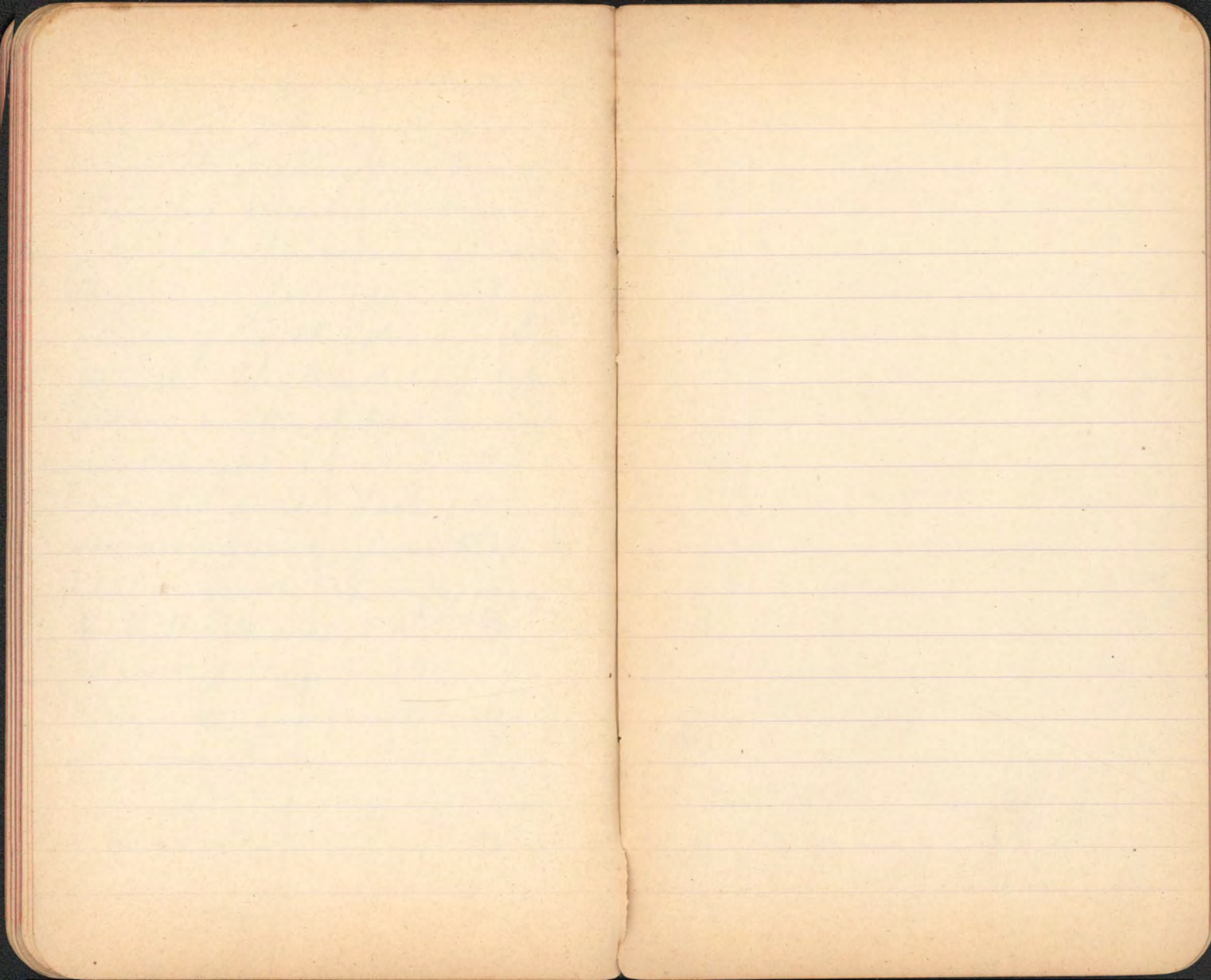

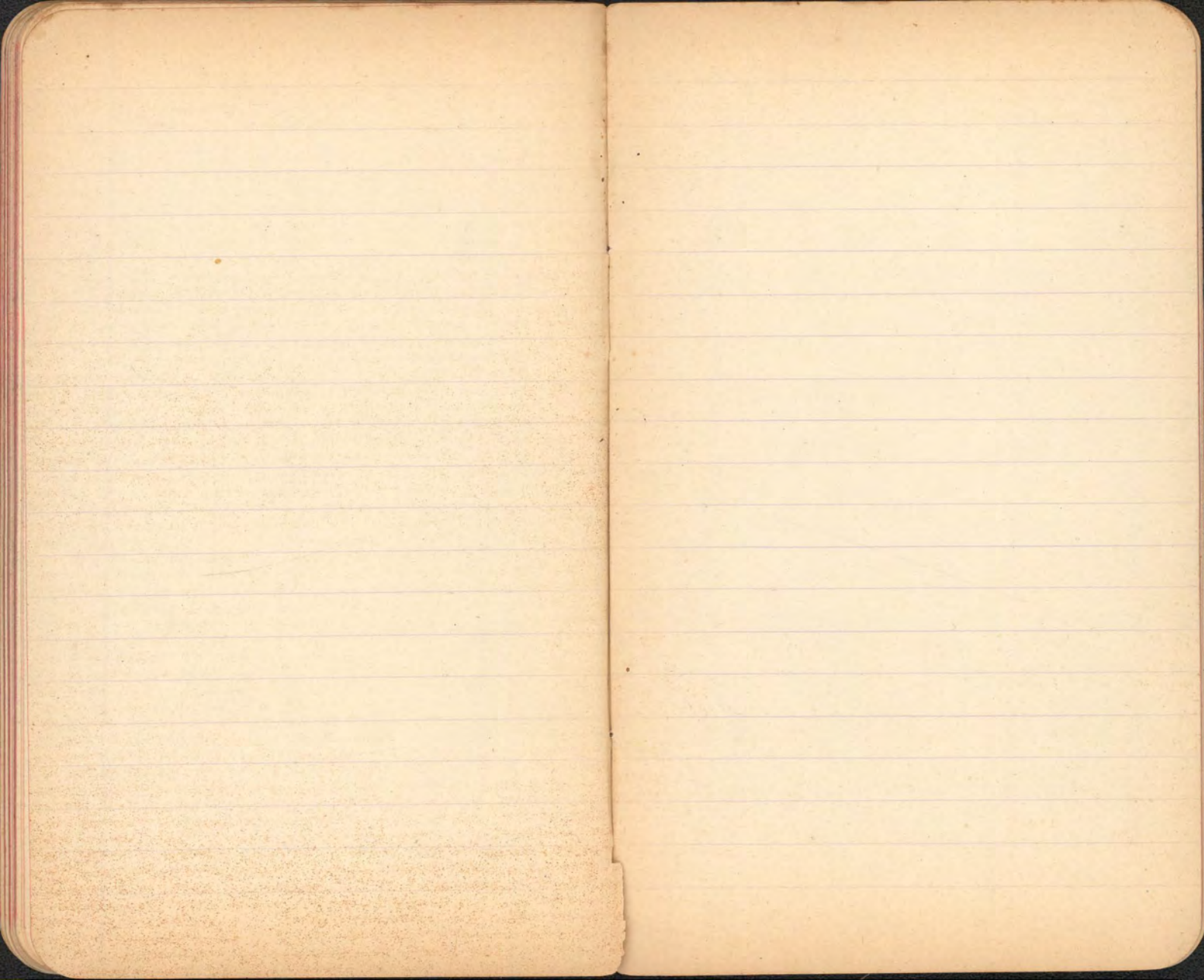
June 4 - Rained all morning

runs through perfectly flat country

The lower slopes are covered
with olive groves and some
vine - the summit is bare of
trees, but green. The country
grows wilder as we approach
Aspinum. Just before reaching
it we pass through a very long
tunnel. The Acropolis of Aspinum
frowns over the station from a
great height. It is very steep
and the middle path (there is
no wagon road) from the
station winds up in zigzags
from the N side. ~~from the N side~~.

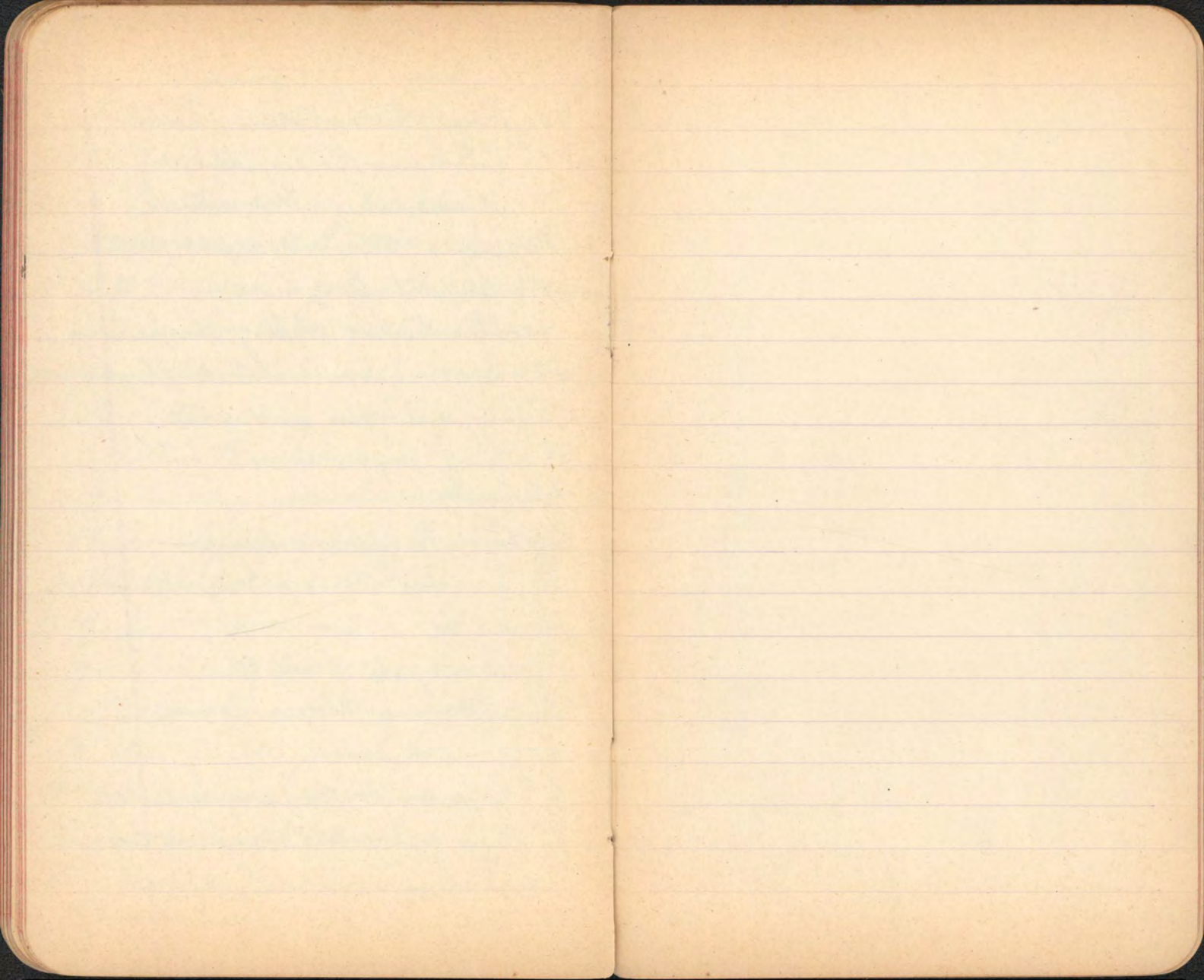

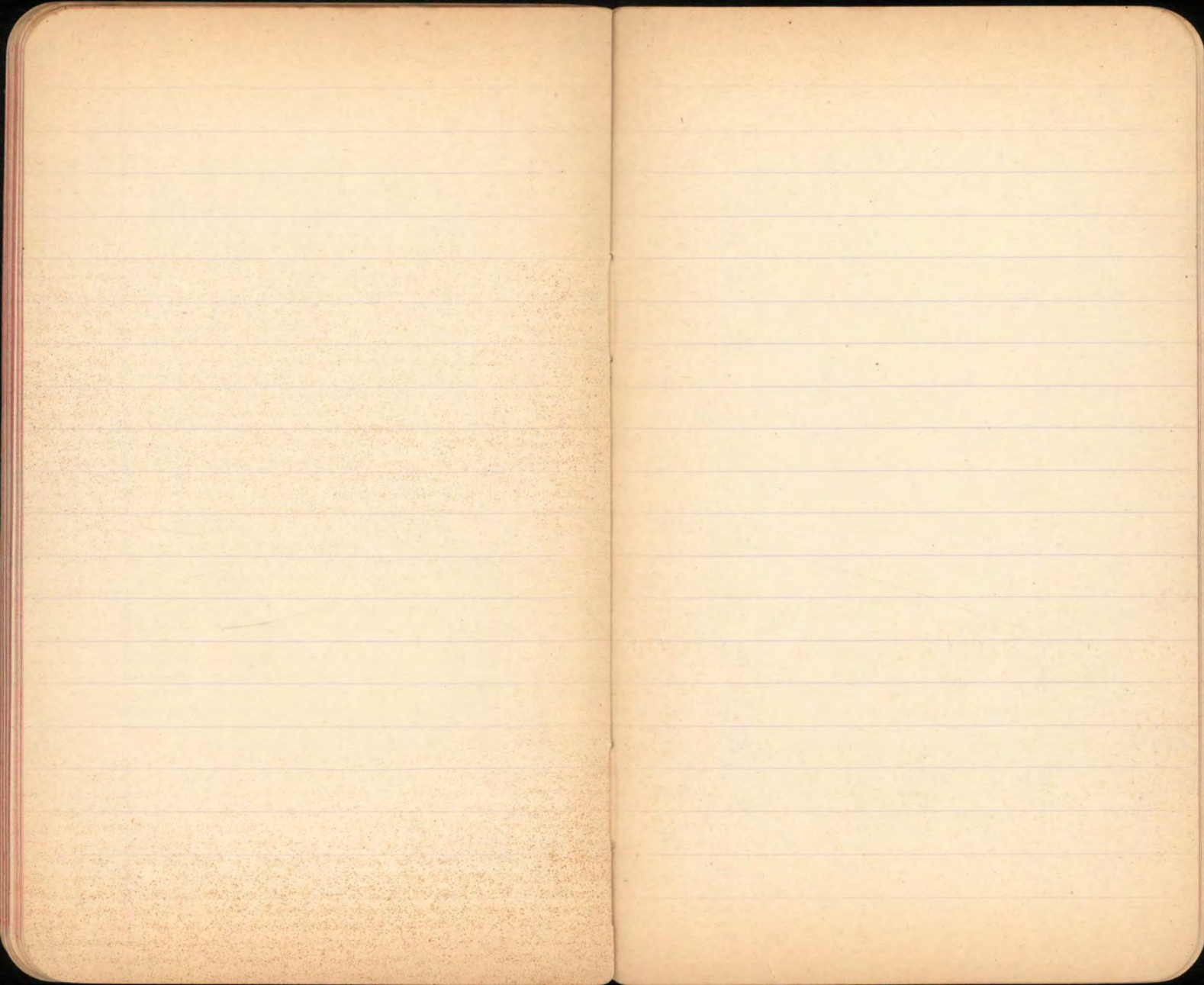

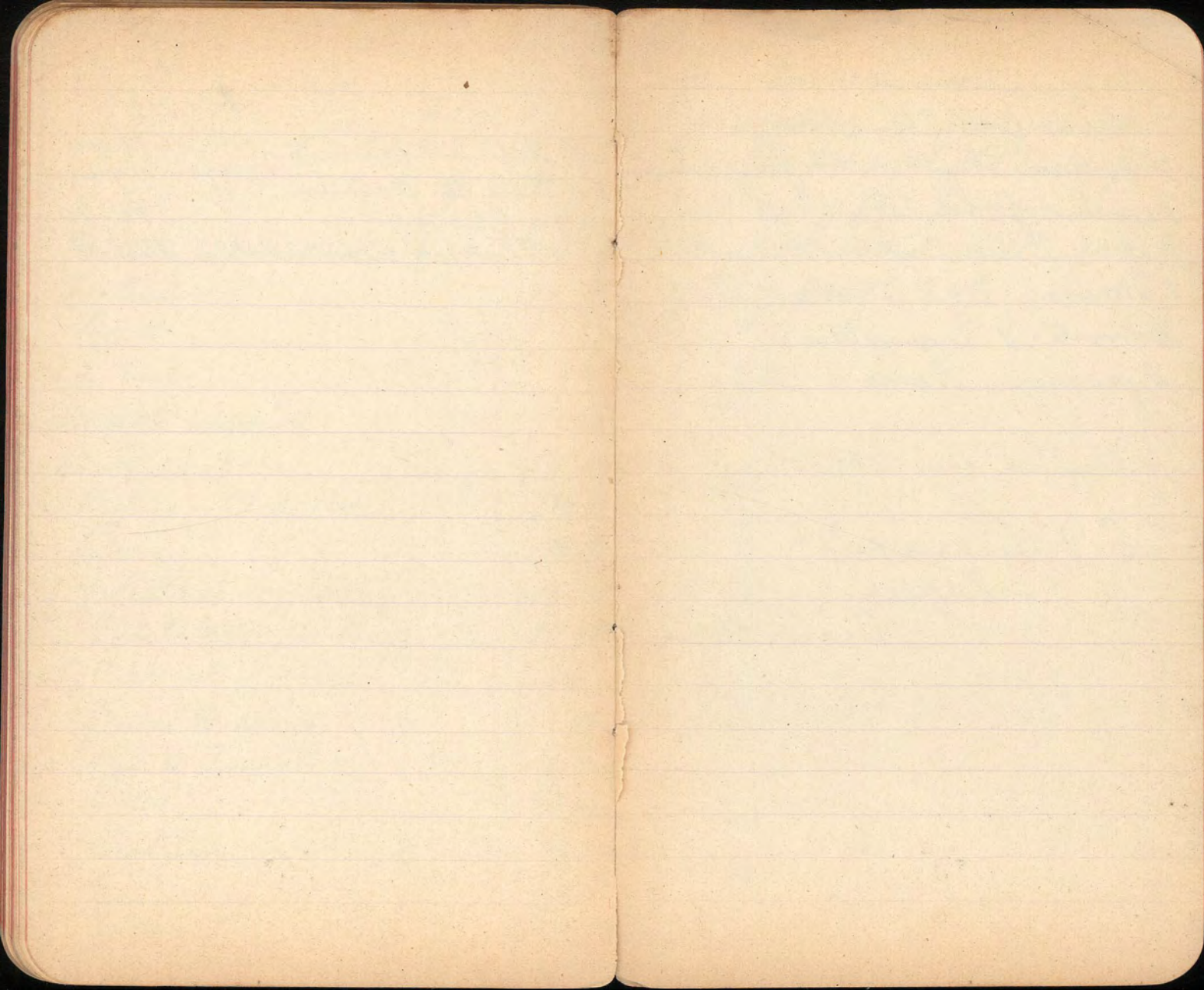
